# Vicar's Viewpoint

Dear Friends,

Earlier this year an advertising campaign was run on London buses with the words: "There's probably no God. Now stop worrying and enjoy your life." This campaign generated considerable press coverage and a lively national debate.

What I found very interesting was the message behind the message. Read the slogan again and ask yourself, "What is the image of God behind this statement?" I would suggest it carries the implication that if God does exist he is, at best, a spoilsport, and at worst he is a tyrant. The image of God that is being conveyed here is one that is a cause not only of worry, but also anxiety and fear.

This raises the vital question, "What is our image of God?" Whatever it is, our image of God will have a fundamental impact on how we relate to him. Our image of God will also colour our view of the Church and how we relate to those around us.

One of the great privileges I have as a Vicar is the opportunity to listen to other people's stories of faith, of formative influences in their lives, and their perception of God. At first this can be on a superficial level of stereotypical images, such as those favoured by cartoonists, with God being pictured as an old man with a white beard sitting on a cloud.

But as I listen more carefully, I discover that spirituality is deep-wired into all of us. When we endeavour to speak openly and honestly about God, setting aside the flippant images, it is often hard to find the words to express our thoughts. Many people are aware of the presence of God, and also of his personal nature. Many speak of God in terms of seeking his loving protection for their loved ones and themselves. A recurring theme is the discovery of God's peace and guidance transcending our own resources.

Sometimes I come across those who find talk about God uncomfortable and present this in statements of unbelief. This may be because deep down, and only partly acknowledged, they have an image of God as a tyrant. In such cases I am reminded of a wise Christian who would say, "Tell me about the God you don't believe in. I probably don't believe in him either."

So what is our image of God? Can we go beyond the general sense of a benign presence? Can we set aside vindictive and vengeful images? Can we have confidence in an understanding of God that isn't simply a project of our own desires or fears? Where do we begin?

A good starting point is Jesus himself. St. Paul says of Jesus, "He is the image of the invisible God." (Colossians 1:15) If we want to know what God is like, then we can begin by looking at Jesus. What I find fascinating is the way Jesus turned existing preconceptions of God on their head. The religious authorities of the day had a clear idea of who was in and who was out; Jesus dismantled these distinctions by deliberately welcoming the outcastes and the "unclean". Many saw God in terms of a distant, even unapproachable, being; Jesus taught his followers to pray to God as "Father". Many saw God in terms of a powerful military leader; Jesus followed the path of vulnerable love.

It is true that the Bible presents us with different images of God, and that over the centuries followers of Jesus have sought to portray him in different ways, so a vital question for us to ask ourselves is "What are the key passages about Jesus that help us to interpret all the others?" In this context, I was very encouraged to hear the response of Nick Cuthbert who will be leading Hopefest later this year. For Nick, a turning point in his life was when he was invited by a friend to listen to David McKinnis who spoke about the story of the Prodigal Son. In this famous parable of Jesus, the overriding image

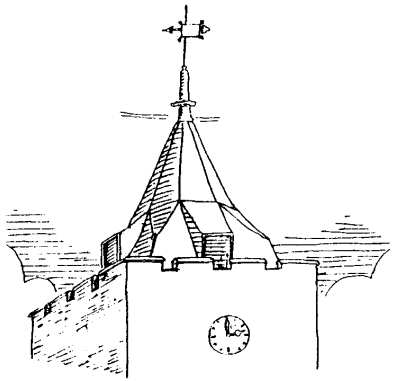
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of God is not as a harsh taskmaster, but as a loving father who runs to meet the son who has wandered astray. The clear message is that God loves each of us and comes to meet us. Nick went on to say, "The Gospel is always good news". This is a very different message from the image of God behind the bus campaign. A key task that Nick Cuthbert will be helping us in is to address unhelpful preconceptions of God and to proclaim the good news that God is calling each of us into a relationship with him. Paradoxically, in terms of the bus posters, it is not in the absence of God, but in this relationship with him that we will truly be able to enjoy life, and live it to the full.

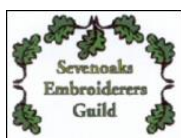

## SPOTLIGHT ON

**PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

The pond has featured in several Newspapers in the past few weeks. The parish council has not sought this publicity but responded to queries from the papers to make it clear that Otford cares greatly about the pond and all its environment, and has taken appropriate action, though, inadvertently in this case, not within the planning framework, to maintain this important heritage asset in the correct manner.

The stones that made up the facing have been repaired or rebuilt more than once in the last hundred years or so, and we now have to repeat this process because the materials and original method of construction were incapable of keeping it secure for more than a few decades. The English Heritage document on "Conservation...", available on the web, recognises that this process is necessary in some cases. The parish council wants to reconstruct the facing this time so it lasts longer than before, holds water securely and is safe for visitors. Several people have come forward recently to provide further details about the pond, and these were interesting and helpful.

Speed and safety on our roads. All roads in Kent are in the process of having their speed restrictions reviewed. The work us being done in three sections and our district will be in the last. A review of our roads is intended in the financial year 2010/1, with the work on alterations in the next financial year and the results considered the following year

(2012/13). The whole process depends on available finance and that is uncertain at the moment, but the parish council should be informed when the review starts here. Traffic levels and road systems change, and speed limits may require adjustment, but the aim is to produce uniform speed standards over Kent, within national guidelines. The County Highways Department is inevitably always under pressure to lower speed limits but I have heard it stated that the only uniform, independent and verifiable standard they can use are the police statistics on serious accidents and deaths. Nobody has come up with an alternative.

"Drains" in Otford It is now realised, after many complaints, that the drains/gullies in the High Street, Station Road and Pilgrims Way, East and West, are deficient in many ways, and this whole area is due to be examined and improved by the Highways Department. No date has been given for the work and it is, of course, dependent on available finance.

The parish council has pointed out that some roads and lanes joining those under review have similar or worse problems, and add to the water that flows along the ones to be examined. There are many springs in Otford and their precise location is rarely known, although we see the output each winter!

Public toilets It seems that at last we have contractor who can repair the doors so they are reasonably vandal proof, at a cost that is reasonable. There is other repair and decoration work to be done but they should be finished shortly.
